House Rules

1. Supervise all dog-kid interactions.
2. Play only safe games with the dog.
3. Do not use aggressive punishment with the dog.
4. If a toddler is touching the dog, an adult also has their hands on the dog.
5. Kids do not give the dog hugs and kisses – scratch the side of his neck instead.
6. Kids leave the dog alone if he is eating, resting, on or under the furniture or has a bone or toy.
